#### PROPOSAL 2: CHANGES TO DOMESTIC BEE LEVY

#### **Proposal**

We propose increasing the levy by 32% to cover annual costs and eliminate the accumulated deficit. The proposed changes set out in the table below:

# 2 What are the reasons for your opinion?

Apiculture NZ members have expressed disappointment at the timing of this increase, and particularly given apparent oversight by MPI in its management of the costs.

ApiNZ appreciates the need for MPI to recover the costs of this service, but it needs to do so in a way that does not accumulate deficits and compound costs on RMP operators in subsequent years to which the services are provided.

In terms of the communication, there is a lot of confusion as to what this levy represents. In future Apiculture NZ recommends MPI provide explanation notes as to what the levy covers. The term 'Domestic Bee Levy' is not understood and recognised by those who pay it.

In addition, there does not appear to have been much thought if any from MPI into the context with which this increase is being applied. Apiculture NZ members have indicated they are doing a lot of work with MPI to bring the cost of verification audits down in a time when it is very difficult for beekeepers to maintain sustainable business operations, and this ad hoc notice of change in the levy does not appear to have been discussed with industry organisations like Apiculture New Zealand involved in this work.

We anticipate the cost to the industry will be \$53,600. Given the current financial difficulty being experienced by those beekeepers primarily harvesting non-manuka honey, some RMP operators have indicated to us they are now considering deregistering in an effort to cut costs. The imposition of the additional cost at this time to address the accumulated deficit is likely to increase their resolve to take this action and potentially withdraw from the industry.

Do you have any specific concerns arising from the emergence of the COVID-19 pandemic for your business? What are the likely impacts of COVID-19 on your business over the next year?

Many smaller beekeeping operators have relied on the presence of overseas tourists in New Zealand as part of their honey sales strategy. Since COVID-19 emerged at the beginning of 2020 this market evaporated, and there is currently no sign of its meaningful return. Those beekeepers who have not been exporters are unlikely to have been able to switch their focus to overseas sales with the inability to travel and develop business in person.

2 What are the reasons for your opinion?

While understanding of the purpose of a levy to enable export trade, Apiculture NZ exporters have expressed a lack of clarity around what the Export Bee Levy pays for.

The notes to the levy say the biggest cost is for contracts for chemical and microbiological assurance for the purpose of exports. This has not been deemed to be a satisfactory explanation by RMP operator members.

RMP operators accept the need to pay a levy for the costs incurred within the year, but question whether now is the right time to be subjected to paying for the accumulated losses from the past – particularly as it appears the losses have been accumulating for some time.
